I'd like to thank all the boys who helped, both with the tower, and with the food service. It was a fun and successful event!








Veteran's Day 2013

The log should include date, start & stop time, location, and the list of who attended. If it's a service/Eagle project, it should include the hours that each participant worked to the nearest half-hour.



If it's a camping trip, it should include number of nights camped for each participant.

It's important to turn in this information in a timely manner. Some scouts may need these activities for advancement. You can hand deliver a paper report or email it to me.

Den Chief

(Optional, but important Troop position!)

Job Description: The Den Chief works with the Cub Scouts, Webelos Scouts, and den leaders in the Cub Scout pack.



Reports to: The Den Leader in the pack and the Assistant Scoutmaster for the New Scout Patrol in the troop.

Rank: 1st Class

Den Chief Duties:

- Serve as the activities assistant at den meetings.
- Meet regularly with the Den Leader to review the den and pack meeting plans.
- If serving as a Webelos Den Chief, prepare boys to join Boy Scouting.
- Project a positive image of Boy Scouting.
- Know the purposes of Cub Scouting.
- Encourage Cub Scouts to join a Boy Scout troop upon graduation.
- Help out at weekly den meetings and monthly pack meetings.
- Attends at least 2/3 of the den meetings/events during his service period.
- Be a friend to the boys in the den.
- Set a good example.
- Wear the Scout uniform correctly.
- Live by Scout Oath and Law.
- Show scout Spirit.

Scout Trail Cooking: Mary Ruth's Honeymoon Chili Recipe

Ingredients:

- 1 to 1¼ pounds lean ground beef or turkey
- ½ cup bread crumbs, finely ground
- 1 large onion
- 1 – 2 cloves garlic
- 3 Tbsp Chili Powder
- 1 15 oz. can kidney or red beans, drained
- 1 10 oz. can tomato puree
- 1 14 oz. can diced tomatoes



In the kitchen:

Work bread crumbs into ground meat with your fingers and set aside for a moment. I add bread crumbs because dehydrated meat infused with bread crumbs rehydrates better on the trail. Also, the bread crumbs absorb and lock in more of the chili flavor. If you are not planning on dehydrating this chili recipe for backpacking, there is no need to add bread crumbs to the meat. You can [make your own bread crumbs](#) by dehydrating bread and crushing with the smooth edge of a meat tenderizing mallet.

Sautee onions and garlic in a little olive oil using just enough to coat the pan. It really helps to use a non-stick pan. Add ground meat and cook for about ten minutes until browned, stirring continuously. Add chili powder and cook for one more minute. Add tomato puree, diced tomatoes, and drained beans. Cook until

bubbling and then reduce heat to a simmer for one hour.



Dehydrate:

Have a taste and put the rest in the refrigerator overnight. The extra time enhances the flavor. Hitting the trail in the morning? Start dehydrating immediately.

Spread chili out on dehydrator trays covered with non-stick Paraflexx® Sheets or parchment paper. Dehydrate at 125° for 8 – 10 hours. This recipe took up three 15 x 15 Excalibur Dehydrator trays. After about four hours in the dehydrator, break up any meat and beans that might be stuck together with a spoon or your fingers to expose pieces to more air circulation.

Once dry, divide dehydrated chili into one cup or larger servings and pack in plastic zip-lock bags. Yield: Five cups weighing about 12 ounces dry.

On the Trail:

Combine one cup chili with one cup water and let sit for about five minutes. If you are cooking a larger serving, just add an equal part of water to your dried chili. Light stove, bring to a boil and continue cooking for one minute. Remove from stove and place pot inside insulating [pot cozy](#) for ten minutes. Stir and enjoy. Garnish with crackers or dried pita bread chips.



In the Beginning

The Boy Scouts of America is an organization founded on the principles of service to others. The story of how it was actually founded is a heartwarming story.

One day in 1909 in London, England, an American visitor, Chicago newspaper publisher William D. Boyce, lost his way in a dense fog. He stopped under a street lamp and tried to figure out where he was. A boy approached and asked if he could be of help.



"You certainly can," said Boyce. He told the boy that he wanted to find a certain business office in the

center of the city.

"I'll take you there," said the boy.


When they got to the destination, Mr. Boyce reached into his pocket for a tip. But the boy stopped him.

"No thank you, sir. I am a Scout. I won't take anything for helping."

"A Scout? And what might that be?" asked Boyce. The boy told the American about himself and his brother Scouts. Boyce became very interested. After finishing his errand, he had the boy take him to the British Scouting office.

At the office Boyce met Lord Baden-Powell, the famous British general who had founded the Scouting movement in Great Britain. Boyce was so impressed with what he learned that he decided to bring Scouting home with him.

On February 8, 1910, Boyce, with the help of Edgar M. Robinson (YMCA) and Ernest Thompson Seton (Woodcraft Indians) founded the Boy Scouts of America. Robinson and the YMCA ran summer camps with outdoor activities. Seton had a fascination with the wilderness that led him to become a naturalist, an artist and an author. His many volumes of Scoutcraft became an integral part of Scouting and made nature study an important part of the Scouting program. He was the first Chief Scout of the BSA in 1910.



Daniel Carter Beard (Sons of Daniel Boone) soon became a founder when he merged his own boy's organization with the BSA. As the first Scout Commissioner, Beard helped to design the original Scout uniform and introduced the elements of the First Class Badge.

The time has come to move forward with online Tour and Activity Plans. We will no longer accept emailed, faxed or walked in Tour and Activity Plans.

Many of you have already been using the online 100% and we Thank you. For those who have not, now it your time to do it. Effective date - After November 15, 2013 the council will only accept/process ONLINE Tour and Activity Plans.

Online Tour and Activity Plan is the only way. It is simply the tool to help leaders be prepared for a safe and fun adventure. It helps you ensure trained leadership is in place as it verifies training of adults going.

Use the online version ONLY. It is a unit-level tool when you sign into [MyScouting.org](https://my.scouting.org).

Please review all of the information on the page and the hyperlinks. A video showing you how to submit a tour and activity plan is on the FAQ page and [here](#).

When using the online version, you no longer have to collect signatures or council review. Complete the plan and certify that any missing requirements will be completed before the trip begins. When you submit the plan, an email will be sent to your council, chartered organization, committee chair, and your designated emergency contact.


